LETTER FROM THE MODERATOR...

Dear Friends,

It is so good to have this opportunity to write to you in this wonderful newsletter that we all contribute to and that is put together with such loving care by Kay. We are into spring. That is what the calendar tells me, though the thermometer belies that. We have tilled the garden and have peas and kale in the ground as we speak. The annual trip to Young's greenhouse has occurred with a full palate of colors tucked into the back of the car to be put into the ground to brighten our view. The daffodils were and continue to be outstanding this year. The crocuses trumpeted the demise of the snowbanks and left soon after. And now we are in May.





I know the question on everyone's lips is, "When are we going to be able to get together again?" Please know that the Church Council has wrestled with that question for the past six months. We formed a task force to look at this issue using a series of 46 questions related to our size, size of building, number of services, use of bibles and hymnals to mention a few of the 46 questions. We feel that we can answer positively to most of them, except the question of space and the recommendation of how many people can occupy our sanctuary at one time, safely. We are hoping for more information later this month as the Governor addresses this question.

A serious question we, as a Council, have debated is: "If vaccinated, can we come together?" We requested a legal opinion from the UCC counsel about asking if a person had been vaccinated. The question that stemmed from that was: What do you do with that information? The general consensus on the Council was first, discomfort in asking the question in the first place, and second, that the information would create a possible segregation of members in the sanctuary. We strongly objected to these ideas. Our target is to all meet while adhering to the state guidelines.

We all understand how important to all of us it is to come together once again. Please understand that the Council will keep safety first as a criteria for getting back together.


We are looking at alternatives, however. We had sunrise service-Live!-at the town beach, which was well attended and was a great celebration of Christ's defeat of the grave. The Deacons have this question on their agenda. Our church committees have not slumbered during the pandemic and we hope to see more activities that will safely bring us together.

With that "teaser" for this newsy newsletter, I pray for our church, our congregation our community, country and the world. May we find the answers to our questions and come safely through to the other side.

Many of us will remember Deb as a featured speaker at a Climate Conversation in the Wilkins House over a year ago. Deb calls herself "*The Personal Ecologist*" and with 25 years ecological experience in the Northeast she can help us all to better understand the natural world and make recommendations for creating a personal habitat which serves both the land and the land owner's wishes.

We will visit a local waterfront property for the hour-long program and professional consultation. *Deb* will guide us on a walk along the shoreline, and and cover the following topics in an interactive style:

- native plantings and landscaping practices that promote biodiversity and protect water quality
- how to build bird and pollinator habitat at home
- eco-friendly and low maintenance lawn alternatives



Update from James Long...



It has been 3 months since my back surgery in Connecticut to fuse 6 vertebrae. At 6 weeks I was flying high...poster boy according to the surgeon. The therapy at our hotel was going really, really well. And I was quite comfortable with the pain. Then we came back to Maine and "all Hell" broke loose. Having no therapy for 10 days was a setback. And, although the surgeon called for "fascia release therapy" in that area, the hospital here does not do any "hands on therapy." It is so helpful to release the fascia at the incision area. The fascia

is a covering similar to lace, about the size of spaghetti strands, rubbery feeling. It provides slip and slide for the layers of muscles, ligaments and tendons to move independently of each other. It took time to find another therapist knowledgable in this technique.

It takes from 3 to 6 months from after the surgery for the fusions to have healed enough to feel good. But the fusions will still not be strong enough for me to do anything physical to any degree. This is when people often get into trouble and destroy the surgery. So...no lifting, bending, or twisting for another 3 months and then 6 more months for a completely healed back. I'm on my way again to the finish line!

As always, Caren is a trooper - taking care of me as needed, working, taking care of the horses and the house, preparing meals, and doing everything possible - exhausted but hanging in there. That's my precious girl...Happy Mother's Day!!

God is good and very gracious...always taking care of me. Thank you, God!
