Invite others to invest in and care for their well-being

Be comfortable with paradox and apparent contradiction

May some of those qualities challenge you, because they are the ones that will stretch you into being an even more effective leader.

Check out the huge number of volunteers working on the breakfasts, the folks who planned the "Make a Joyful Noise" service, the Music Committee planning the concerts at the church in October and in December, the guys from the congregation beautifying our grounds by constructing a space for meditation, the Mission Committee planning outreach through the Heifer Project and of course the weekly message from our Minister about how God loves us all. After the first six months, the income is on schedule and if all the pledges are met, we should meet our operating income plan.


GOOD NEIGHBOR SERVICE TREE

- You can request a service that would assist you in some manner.




The services and requests are limitless, but sometimes it can be the simplest offer or request that can provide much needed assistance.




Music news

Dianne Morse-Leonard's memories - growing up in Waterford

Sunday school memories: the Sunday school booklets were filled with stories and colored illustrations from the Bible. My mother, Elaine Morse, was Sunday school superintendent for several years when I was young. Being an avid gardener, every spring she would plant marigolds to give to each child in Sunday school. We would have a special presentation, and everyone would have a short part to say. All of us would be recognized and presented with a marigold.

We had a busy Sunday school. At times we had so many classes held in the Wilkins House that we even had to have classes on the stage and upstairs in the attic room!

One of my favorite things was changing from the Waterford Church to the South Waterford Methodist Church, which we did during the warmer months. There were different deacons for each church, and it was fun to switch buildings and have new places to run around and play games outside! But all the while, we were still one church community.



Church mornings always seemed to start with a huge rush to pile all of us Morse's into our station wagon and get to church in the Flat before the service started. We usually sat somewhere near the back so we wouldn't be real obvious coming in.

When Rev. Lewis Jones came (in the late 60's), he started the Hanging of the Greens special service on the first Sunday of Advent. Many community people came to help. We dressed in blue choir gowns and even practiced ahead so our motions would be seamless as we decorated the church for Christmas. We had delicious refreshments at the Wilkins House, and the church was filled with people from around the area for this special event.

When the Pegels came from Germany, via a missionary stint in Micronesia, in the 70's, they started a youth group. With their five children it was easy to pull together area youth for fun activities such as ice skating, sing-alongs, overnights in the Wilkins House and trick-or-treating for UNICEF.

For me, it was all a "surprised by God" adventure!!












